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### SPEECH DAY

The Junior School ended the school year with their annual Speech Day and Prize Giving.

Parents and children were treated to two slideshows. The first was of photos of some highlights of the school year, accompanied by the choir singing 'A Cover is not the Book' from Mary Poppins and 'Adiemus' from 'Songs of Sanctuary' by Karl Jenkins. The second slide show was of photos of children displaying talents out of school – and what a wide variety there were!

There was an introduction from school governor Mike Bolton, who spoke about some of the achievements of this year:

"This year I am pleased to be able to inform you that, not only have our Governing Body recognised the great work happening in the Junior School, but also the Junior School team have received two important external awards.

The first of which is for our Nursery. The Nursery has been awarded 'Top 20 Nurseries in the South East of England' – congratulations to Mrs Brown and Miss Radford for providing such a first class start to a child's educational journey.

The second award is 'High Performance Learning', after two years of working towards this prestigious title we have gained the status of being a global leading school – one of only 26 schools in England and joining a partnership of a further 16 across the world. At St Lawrence College we are never complacent and continually strive to provide excellence in all that we do."

Mrs Rowe then went on to talk in more detail about the children's achievements during the past year:

"It has been a successful year in the classroom, with children of all ages and abilities making excellent progress.

In recent tests for Years 2 to Year 6, more than 50% of the scores were a year or more above the pupil's actual age with over 45% hitting the top threshold for their age.


In the Kent Test, half of Year 6 pupils who took the test were selected as of Grammar School ability. A fantastic result, particularly as the test is designed for only the top 20% to succeed. Pleasingly, many of those successful pupils are amongst the 27 of our 40 Year 6 who are staying in the College next year.

This Year's sixth form Head of School was a former Junior School pupil, and in 7 years' time, one of this year's Year 6 could be too...

A really important element of being a 'High Performance Learning' school is to instil and nurture values, attitudes and attributes in the children that will lead to success in their lives, in the widest sense. This is the reason we offer a 'rounded education'. Yes, we see academic progress as our top priority, but we also create a curriculum full of events, school trips and experiences ensuring there is time to learn in an active and fun manner.

Through High Performance Learning we encourage children to be concerned for society, collaborative and confident.

They show genuine concern for society through the wide range of charity initiatives and in their art and spoken words, seen and heard at that special evening at the Turner gallery - when the children called upon us all to protect the environment.



In terms of confidence our children dominated the Speech, Drama and Music competition at the Thanet Festival.

We see collaboration across our sports teams. Our strongest sports this year for girls was netball and for boys it was the unbeaten hockey season.

Other highlights of our year have been our Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and

Maths enrichment day. Our World Book day, our very own Mardi Gras and hatching chicks in the Nursery. With a fantastic Sports Day and the hilarious school show Porridge completing the year in style."

The prizes were presented by our guest speaker Alex Caldon, Musical Director of CantiaQuorum. Congratulations to all prize winners! ■

#### ABRSM RESULTS & MUSIC

Our Junior orchestra at St. Lawrence has been going from strength to strength this year and we were delighted to welcome new members Olivia Leigh Hunt on Clarinet, Taya Glushko on Flute and Irene Dho (Violin) and Lucy Welch (Cello) to the strings section in the Lent term, swelling our numbers to 15. The children worked hard on several pieces in preparation for the summer teatime concert with some of them additionally taking part in an exciting Revelation strings concert at Dover Town Hall on 24th March performing both Ghostbusters and I'd like to teach the world to sing.

Across this academic year our Junior instrumentalists have been busy preparing for their Associated Board of the Royal Schools of Music exams and have achieved some strong results. 23 of our children successfully passed their Grades with high marks in Violin, Cello, Flute, Recorder, Singing, Drums and Piano, with some passing on more than one instrument. Particular mention to Taejun Choi and Charlotte Welch, who both successfully passed their Grade 3 Cello this year as well as Irene Dho who in the Spring took her Grade 3 on both Violin and Piano achieving Distinction for both. Maia Perry also deserves special mention for

I have enjoyed getting to know everyone in our Junior School, and I look forward to the new school year. ■



### POLE

Pole (Pupils' Outdoor Learning Curriculum) or Forest School as we like to call it, has become a cherished part of our everyday curriculum. All children from Nursery right through to our Year 6 pupils take part in regular sessions throughout the year. The programme includes an array of activities and experiences, including scavenger hunts, environmental art, tool work, crafts, den-building, mud kitchens and toasting marshmallows on campfires. As teachers we are witnessing the many benefits that our children are developing through this holistic approach to learning. They are becoming creative, confident and independent learners who are strengthening their personal, social and emotional skills whilst increasing their respect for the natural world.

This year we have developed our Forest School site further with an outside classroom and stable. These buildings allow us to store equipment and shelter from the elements if required. We also now have three purpose-built mud kitchens, three blackboards and a digging pit for the children to explore and investigate.

Following the Forest school ethos, 'there is no such thing as bad weather, only inappropriate clothing' it is clear most of our children have certainly embraced this mantra. Year 5 pupils were undeterred by the sleet flurries when painting their kindness stones and Year 4 could not have been happier building dens in rain showers.


















After a fantastic summer full of sunshine, it was decided that we should take the whole school to the beach for a morning of outdoor learning experiences. The day we chose was the day the weather broke (for the morning at least). However, being eager outdoor types we endeavoured to face the elements, (wind and drizzle) and conquer the beach environment

A variety of activities were put in place:

Beach combing: there were two activities within this section, Mr Brown led an interesting discussion on beach safety and the lifeboats. The Ramsgate crew kindly obliged in assisting us with our learning and sailed past mid talk. Mrs Danes and Mrs Mayo improvised by providing a selection of possible items of waste that would have been found on the beach on a day when perhaps the wind had not already cleared them. The children still managed to



experiment using litter pickers and were able to discuss the nature of waste products they had previously encountered on trips to the beach.

Story telling: Mr Perry and Miss Timcke used their outdoor voices' to re-enact Sea themed favourites from our school library namely Sharing a Shell and Tiddler. The children were encouraged to be actively involved in the retelling of the stories, not least to keep the blood flowing through their chilly bodies.

Beach Art: Mrs Mackman, Ms Caddick and Mr McPherson led a creative sculpture activity. The children were encouraged to use their buckets and spades, plus items from the beach to make a sea themed sculpture. The outcomes were varied from Mr Twit and his seaweed beard, through to mermaids, speed boats and traditional sand castles.

Beach Games: Mr Macauley, Mr Marsh and Miss Walton kept the children actively engaged in parachute games. The most



popular being one that involved huddling together like penguins in the Antarctic.

Prep-Prep: Joined us a little later in hope that the weather might improve. The children were supervised in their explorations and child-led games.

It was wonderful that so many parents were able to join us for the morning and share the experiences alongside the children. Unfortunately we had to cut our trip short as the wind brought an unexpected chill to proceedings. This has not fazed us and we intend to return and make use of the wonderful learning environment on our doorstep. The children have continued their discussions and learning about preserving the oceans back in the classroom. Years 3-6 are now embarking upon modelling giant seathemed sculptures using waste plastic to raise awareness of the issues that our future generations may be faced

#### **100 Tons of Plastic**



On Dec 3 2018, Former SLC pupil, George Heming, returned to St Lawrence to speak to Junior School pupils in morning Assembly about his goal to be responsible in some way of removing 100 tons of plastic waste from our shores and seas.

George has always been a keen sailor, so has seen for himself the increase of plastic waste in the water. This led him to setting up 100 Tons of Plastic. He wanted to set a challenge that hasn't been done before while educating and raising awareness of the problem.

Junior School pupils have been learning about the problems that plastic has caused in the world's oceans and took part in a beach enrichment day earlier on in the term, including a beach clean.

Year 6 pupils also ran their own mini-Christmas fair for fellow pupils to raise money and awareness of the plastic in our oceans. Several of the children feel very passionate about this cause and successfully spearheaded a campaign last year against single-use straws at the school.

### ROALD DAHL DAY

On 13 September, schools across the country were engaging in a celebration of his wonderful literature and the children in our school enthusiastically supported an opportunity to share the stories they love the most from his collection of witty tales.

Some children wrote an invitation to one of his characters to share a meal with them; others designed characters that would easily fit into a Dahl plot; one group of children found their favourite descriptive passages and reflected on what captured their interest; Year 5 artists researched Roald Dahl's illustrator Sir Quentin Blake and attempted sketching in his famous style; all were able to share in discussion about their favourite storylines, books films and characters and a very fortunate few earned a treat to read their favourite books in a classroom den (under the table) just like Matilda.

In Assembly we sang one of Tim Minchin's songs, When I Grow Up from the musical Matilda. Then, back in the classroom, we put the final touches to our work in order to create a display celebrating Roald Dahl.

During Saturday Activities the Drama Group read through the play, The Three Little Pigs, which is based on the Revolting Rhymes version of the fairy tale that Roald Dahl wrote. Our young actors particularly loved Red Riding Hood's lines and the twist in the plot, which is typical of a Roald Dahl story.


Their term started off a little disappointingly, with such a close result in our first fixture, but their progress was evident by the results going forwards.

#### RAILWAY TRIP












#### ROYAL BRITISH LEGION SUMMER FETE

T he Art department has been a hive of activity this year. All children from Year 3 to Year 6 have been involved in projects that were inspired by our school's growing awareness of the issue our planet faces with ocean plastic.

Every child collaged a sea creature using waste paper and crafted a 'fossil of the future' from clay. The sea creature tiles produced as 'fossils of the future' were to represent and honour the creatures that the children hope to still be in existence when they grow to be the age of their grandparents. Every tile produced was exhibited at The Turner Contemporary.

All children have been able to participate in observational drawing tasks, illustration tasks and build upon their understanding of colour theory. They have used a variety of media, learning the difference between tight and loose media, or as the children like to call them precise and clumsy.

The jungle picture challenge encouraged all children to design and illustrate a fantasy jungle which included all the animals they would wish to see if they were to travel across the world. This project ran over a number of weeks in class and was used as something they could return to and add to when waiting for other work to dry. There were some outstanding final illustrations completed, depicting animals from all across the globe. Congratulations to our challenge winners: Ada Year 3, RosieYear 4, Raphael Year 5 and Ekaterina Year 6. They each received watercolour pencils to help with their future projects and copies of their stunning pictures are framed to go on display in the Whittle Room.

Having a kiln to use within the Canon Perfect Art Studio in the senior school has enabled us to use clay for 3D modelling. As mentioned previously, all children made a tile, but in addition Year 3 later used their modelling skills to make animal tiles; Year 5 made small figurines of characters from Harry Potter (post their trip to the Warner Brother's Studios) and Year 6 made fantasy tree pots using a pinch pot technique. Learning how to model in clay was an absolute favourite across all the years and will certainly feature again in next year's planned art activities.

Year 3 linked their Geographical studies of Mexico with their focus on contemporary Mexican artwork and Year 4 linked History with their understanding of Tudor Portraits which they applied to their very own replica self-portraits. Art has provided opportunities for deep thinking about our place in the world, the messages we wish to convey through our visual work and as a means to helping us make sense of the world in which we live. Real time creative activities allow the children to relax and explore. We hope you appreciate the wonderful work our school of artists have produced this year.






